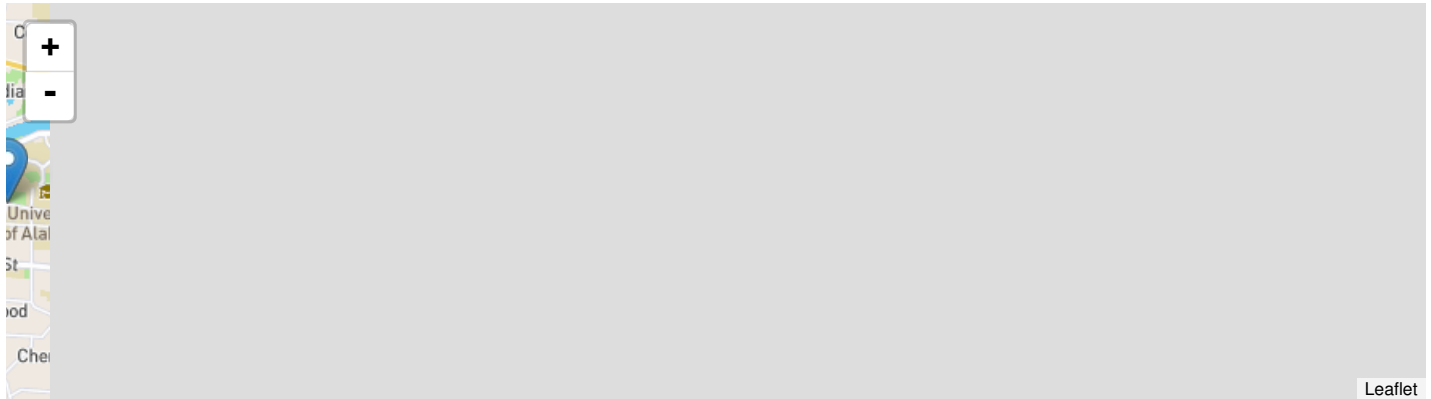


CrossingPoints Tier 1 Program ^[1]

Tier 1 serves students with significant disabilities ages 18-21 years who are still receiving IDEA services. Tier 1 follows the Tuscaloosa City Schools and Tuscaloosa County school systems' Academic year calendar. Students follow the transition curriculum entitled "Life Center Career Education" involving Daily Living skills, Personal Social Skills, Occupational Guidance and Preparation.
